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Hertfordshire Police Report Driving Licence Changes



From 8th June 2015 the counterpart to the photocard driving licence is being abolished. The counterpart was introduced in 1998 to display driving licence details that could not be included on the photo card.

These details include current endorsements or penalty points and any provisional driving entitlement categories.

Historically, if the counterpart needed updating, say for example, to add or remove penalty points, it would need to be sent to the DVLA, who would send a new one back to you in the post. So from June you could (but I wouldn't) throw away the paper part of your driving licence. The DVLA is removing this part of the licence in an attempt to reduce costs and "red tape".

Any points that are gained or lost will be amended electronically - this information will be available to car hire companies and employers as well as the police who need to check that a prospective driver is allowed to drive the vehicle. The information is only available to those who have a right to see it and only with the licence holder's permission.

You can check your own driving licence by going to www.uk/view-driving-licence this service will be available 24/7, you will be required to provide your driving licence number or your name and date of birth, in addition you will have to provide your home post code and your national insurance number.

This will enable you to see the following information;

- Personal details - name, address and date of birth
- Status of licence (full, disqualified or revoked)
- Licence expiry date
- Licence issue number
- Class of vehicles you are allowed to drive
- Plus of course any points you may have gained (or lost)

Insurance companies are talking about a reduction in your premium as they can check your current details rather than taking your word that you have a clean licence!

Personally I will be holding onto the paper part of the driving licence as if you ever need to hire a vehicle abroad they will need to check your detail's and it's easier to give them a bit of paper rather than searching on line when you have just had an 8 hour flight! By PCSO Ian Martin

Fly tipping

Fly tipping is illegal dumping of rubbish. From bin bags, fridges and mattresses to large amounts of waste dumped from trucks, it can be found anywhere along roadsides, in lay-bys or on private land. If you see someone fly tipping or if you witness someone fly tipping, please note down as many details of the event as possible, such as: the date and time that you saw the fly tippers or discovered the rubbish the exact location (address, landmarks, etc.) details of the items dumped, e.g. builders rubble, a description of the person/people dumping the rubbish. The fly tipper's vehicle registration, make, model and colour. **DBC** will visit every report of fly tipping to investigate where the rubbish has come from and who was responsible for dumping it. **DBC** aim to remove all items on council managed land within seven working days. With thanks in a large part to the generous and much-appreciated financial support from the Nash Mills Parish Council's Resident Association's Initiative, over 60 members of the CRA (both past and present) enjoyed a memorable and nostalgic afternoon recently, in celebrating the 50th anniversary of the completion of the 64 houses in the association.

Back in 1965, in a year when Sir Winston Churchill died, Sir Stanley Matthews played his last First Division game of football, Harold Wilson was Prime Minister and the Beatles had their last live tour in the UK, people were beginning to move into 140 - 253 Chambersbury Lane!

Amazingly, eight of those 64 residents still live in their same houses today and we were delighted that of those eight, six were fit and able enough to not only join in on the event, but to share some of their earlier memories as well. Not least of all was the recollection by one resident that the price of his house went up from £4,700 to £4,900 during the time he was buying it and the only way he could afford to go ahead with the purchase was to sell his beloved Ford Anglia!!



With the event staged at Chambersbury School - where a historical display of old house deeds, newspaper articles, vintage photographs and many other items of nostalgic ephemera filled the school hall - and to the backdrop of a summer picnic theme, folk relaxed, enjoyed the friendship and camaraderie of neighbours both old and new and spent many a happy hour re-living and reminiscing on how things had changed over the past 50 years!



A '1965-themed' quiz, a raffle, the creation of a time-capsule and a special presentation of an orchid to each of the '50-year' householders, all helped to round off a truly splendid celebration and left people wondering what the next 50 years might bring!!

Synergy Dacorum: Your Local Advice Services Working Together to Support You

A project funded by Big Lottery has brought together 20 local agencies to support all Dacorum residents with specialist advice and support services.

Known as Synergy Dacorum, this integrated service is coordinated by the Dacorum District Citizens Advice Bureau. The project simply means that local residents can get better access to help and advice on a wide range of areas, for example about benefit entitlements, debt advice, housing issues, neighbour disputes, mental health and relationship or addiction problems to name but a few.

Since it was launched at the end of 2013, over 500 local people have been guided through to get the specialist advice and support they need more effectively and quickly and without simply being 'signposted' and having to repeat their story over again to the different services.

Along with the Dacorum Citizens Advice Bureau the 19 Synergy Dacorum partners are: Carers in Hertfordshire; Dacorum Community Trust; DENS; Volunteer Centre Dacorum; Relate Dacorum, Watford and Three Rivers; Dacorum Family Services; Druglink; Age UK Dacorum; Community Action Dacorum; Mediation Hertfordshire; Herts Mind Network Ltd; Dacorum Borough Council; Dacorum MENCAP; The Salvation Army The Centre in the Park; 4-AM For Arts and Music; Turning Point Housing Link Dacorum; Home-Start Dacorum; and The South Hill Centre.

The Synergy Dacorum project has also had the effect of bringing all of these organisations closer together, raising awareness and strengthening advisers' knowledge of the excellent range of expertise and support available for people in the local area.

All of these organisations are working together to make it easier for people to get good advice when they need it so that people will experience:

- easier access to advice and information;
- local advice providers working in partnership;

The Dacorum District Citizens Advice Bureau has offices in Hemel Hempstead and Berkhamsted. Walk-in sessions and appointments are available at both sites. Evening appointments are available in Hemel Hempstead.

Like all Citizens Advice Bureaux, Dacorum CAB is a registered charity in its own right, working within the policies and the standards of advice provision that are set by the established national Citizens Advice organisation. The Bureau is staffed mainly by volunteers and provides high quality, impartial, independent and confidential advice free of charge to people throughout Dacorum. We respond to each individual's needs and circumstances regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation, race or ethnicity.

The Bureau's open door 'drop in' service where anyone can get tailored face-to-face advice from a trained adviser is a fundamental part of the service. 'Drop in' advice is available 4 days a week in either the Hemel Hempstead or Berkhamsted offices. These sessions offer advice on a huge variety of issues - from questions about in- and out-of-work benefits entitlements and managing debt to housing matters, consumer complaints or relationship difficulties, employment issues and discrimination advice. Hertfordshire County Council's Fire and Rescue Service



Due to new smoke alarm rules **free** smoke alarms are being offered to private landlords ahead of a change in the law.

From **1 October** this year, anyone renting out a property will, by law, have to make sure that there is at least one working smoke alarm on every floor of the property, and a carbon monoxide detector in properties where solid fuel is burned.

To help landlords gear up for the new regulations the government has provided Hertfordshire Fire and Rescue Service with a limited number of free smoke and carbon monoxide alarms to give out to relevant landlords.

Richard Thake, Cabinet Member for Community Safety, said "People without a smoke alarm are four times more likely to die in a fire, so these new regulations will make a real difference to the safety of people who are renting properties.

"We want to make it as easy as possible for landlords to comply with the new rule, which is why we're highlighting them well in advance. I'd encourage landlords to get ahead of the game and register for the free alarms straight away."

Landlords who want to take advantage of the free smoke alarm offer will need to register online at www.hertsdirect.org/fire and collect their alarms from one of the following nearby fire stations: Hemel Hempstead Fire Station, Queensway, Hemel Hempstead, HP2 5HA or Watford Fire Station, Lower High Street, Watford, WD17 2AG. A Victorian Courtship

Within twenty years of completing his apprenticeship John Dickinson had become a man of means with two residences, one in London at the fashionable Rutland Gate, convenient for riding in Hyde Park, and the other the recently completed Abbot's Hill. With one daughter already married into a wealthy family, Dickinson was anxious that his youngest daughter, Harriet, should marry well. She 'came out' in the 1843 season during which her father held thirty-five dinner parties at his house. Harriett also attended seventeen others as well as fourteen balls and sat through several operas.

On her return to Abbot's Hill Harriett would go out in the carriage visiting with her mother, then play cards in the evening with her parents. To make up a table her cousin, John, five months younger, would often come up two or three time a week. John Evans had come to work for Dickinson in 1840 and lived in a cottage at the bottom of Bunkers Lane. In due course John Evans and Harriet fell in love, much to the annoyance of her father who hoped for a wealthy and fashionable marriage for her.

On telling Dickinson of their wish to marry he forbade an announcement. Marriage to a clerk in his employment did not suit his plans. The young couple, forbidden to see each other, were not deterred. Messages carried by servants and John Evans standing to wave in a field on the corner as her coach swept by had to serve, until, at long last, her father relented.

On 12 September 1850 they were married in Abbot's Langley church. John Evans was made a partner of Dickinson's company and went on to manage the business in due course. And so another Victorian Melodrama has a happy ending.
